Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, have high attendance, make good progress and benefit from a broad range of activities and opportunities whilst at school. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal.

We recognise that high-quality teaching has the greatest impact on progress and is therefore a priority, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	<p><u>Maths:</u></p> <p>The school's maths assessment data shows that disadvantaged pupils are achieving lower than their non-disadvantaged peers.</p>
2	<p><u>Wider opportunities and experiences:</u></p> <p>National data has shown that disadvantaged pupils have suffered disproportionately as a result of missing out on the experiences provided by schools during the pandemic.</p>
3	<p><u>Attendance:</u></p> <p>The school's attendance data shows that disadvantaged pupils have a lower attendance than their non-disadvantaged peers and are more likely to be persistent absentees.</p>

<p><u>Attendance:</u></p> <p>Improved attendance.</p>	<p>Attendance data shows an increase in attendance for disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>Attendance data shows a decrease in the number of disadvantaged pupils that are persistent absentees.</p>

Activity in this academic year

This details how we intend to spend our pupil premium funding this academic year to address the challenges listed above.

Maths

Budgeted cost: **£7,000**

Activity
Embed new approach to teaching maths-White Rose Maths, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Purchasing concrete resources;• Maths training for all teachers and LSAs

Wider opportunities and experiences

Budgeted cost: **£116,000**

Activity
Plan one curriculum linked educational visit/workshop per term which is free for disadvantaged pupils.
Expand club provision to include 5 days a week of after school club, and an out of term time holiday club, with reduced charge for disadvantaged pupils.
Introduce Forest School in all year groups.
Employ a specialist music teacher to provide instrument tuition.
Assign a Pastoral lead to run pastoral/well being interventions.
Employ a sports coach to run lunchtime activity sessions

Attendance

Budgeted cost: **£3,000**

Introduce attendance raffles with a half termly reward for good attendance.

Total budgeted cost: £126,000
